



NSPCC—Speak Out Stay Safe

In January, classes from Year 1 to Year 6 will be taking part in the NSPCC's Speak Out. Stay Safe programme. It aims to help children to understand abuse in all its forms and how to recognise the signs of abuse; that abuse is never a child's fault and they have the right to be safe; where to get help and the sources of help available to them as well as and including the NSPCC's Childline service. Our Anti-Bullying week in November highlighted our children's role as upstanders by 'making a noise about bullying'. The NSPCC's programme will further enhance this. Nineteen schools with the Trust have already or are due to deliver this programme this year.

At the end of every governors meeting we spend time discussing what we can celebrate. This time Mrs Spurr, our Clerk to the Governors requested that Governors share their 'what can we celebrate?' for the end of term newsletter. Here is what a few of them said:

<u>Janet Marriner</u> - It was wonderful at Experience Church to see all the pupils come into church, class by class, and for the children to be so engaged with all the discussions and activities. So many said how helpful they found having short times of silence and reflection.

<u>Val Hackforth</u> - We should embrace the enthusiasm of the children for instigating the various causes for which they want to raise money, whole-heartedly thank all members of staff for their dedication and encouragement and finally, thank the parents/carers for their generosity in supporting the school.

<u>Dawn Kennett</u> - In November I went on a learning walk around school with the Head and Chair of governors looking at behaviour and attitudes to learning. I was impressed with how engaged all the children were and focused on their learning. Year 3 particularly stood out, working together, looking enthusiastically at a story text that they had been studying. Also in class 4 the children were studying numeracy, working in pairs quietly helping each other. In every class the behaviour was wonderful.

<u>Laura Stubbs</u> - I've really enjoyed spending time in Year 3 and Year 4 on Friday mornings during Autumn Term. It's been a pleasure to see how well settled, focused and happy the children are and their absolute enthusiasm for the topics they are learning. The discussions and conversations I heard around remembrance day showed such maturity and compassion - it was lovely to hear.

<u>Lis Wainwright</u> - My highlight of the term was meeting many of our new starters when I visited the Inspire unit. It was brilliant to see how they have all settled so well into school life and how much they are enjoying all of their learning.

<u>Helen Loney</u> - I thoroughly enjoyed listening to the children's Reading Session on Friday 20th October. It was clear to see children enjoyed reading throughout the school and it is actively encouraged at home as well as in the classroom. The children were able to recall information from a story and add their own thoughts about what may happen next. I also sat with some of the children in different years and their passion for books and stories was brilliant. They all were very enthusiastic to talk to be about certain books they were reading or had read which is lovely to see.

Attendance

This term we have seen an increase in the number of holiday requests being made in term time, since returning in September we have seen 29 children taking time off in term time resulting in 112 days of school. We have also seen an increase in the number of pupils arriving late at school, the total number of late arrivals since our return in September is 192.
