Lights, Camera, Action



Magna

As part of our Science topic, Year 3 and 4 took a trip to Magna in Sheffield. The children had the opportunity to explore the 4 pavilions: water, wind, fire and earth. Each pavilion was full of different activities and experiments for the children to take part in. Miss Stanton Pavilions

'Fire: In the fire pavilion we learned how they would heat up scrap metal to solidify it. We also got to see a fire tornado.

Wind: In the wind pavilion we saw how wind could be used. We also used a wind canon.






SEND and PSHE update—Mr White

The number of children at school with an identified Special Educational Need or Disability is still sitting above the National Average. The number of children with an Education, Health and Care Plan is below the National Average.

We have completed the first year of our revised Personal Social Health Economic (PSHE) education curriculum. We will return in the autumn term where there will be a whole school focus on Relationships. This is taught progressively from EYFS where the children learn about friendships and making friends to Year 6 where the children will learn about different types of relationships, consent and respect others opinions and beliefs. As part of our wider safeguarding curriculum, starting from September, we will endeavour to make the children aware of the risks in their local environment and how to enjoy the local villages safely. We will have an increased focus on building sites, road safety, water safety (river), farming, behaviour around cattle and the increased littering that the children have acknowledged.



Art Club

We have produced some lovely artwork in our Tuesday Art Club sessions. Children got the opportunity to use different mediums and learn some new techniques.
