





Dear Parents and Carers,

We have come to the end of another fantastic year at Tockwith Church of England Primary Academy where the children have lived life in all its fullness throughout the year. I am amazed that at the end of this year, I will have been the headteacher of Tockwith for 10 years. It, and the educational landscape, have changed a lot over the last 10 years but some things stay the same. The children remain incredible and the staff remain passionate about giving the children the best start of their educational life as they can. There is something very special about this place.

The cherry on top of this year was a visit from His Majesty's inspectorate in the form of OFSTED. I wrote to you earlier to inform you that the report will not be published until September and I will look forward to sharing it with you then. I had the pleasure of sharing our parent view with you as well (https://parentview.ofsted.gov.uk/parent-view-results/survey/result/173531/13)

This highlighted that 98% of you would recommend our school to another parent and feel that their child is happy at our school.

In our aims, we talk about inspiring children to reach their individual potential. This has been particularly evident this year with every single data point of the school highlighting that we are above the national average and in a lot of places this is significantly above. I have broken this down further for you within this newsletter but I really do think this is something to be very proud of and gives our children excellent preparation for the future.

This year saw the creation of the Einstein and Picasso class in the Early Years and we welcomed 39 children to join us this year and it has been a pleasure to see how well they have settled into life at Tockwith. Next year, we have 35 children joining us which has meant we have evolved to introduce the Inspire unit. Due to the increased numbers of children coming into the school in the future the dynamics of how the children's year groups are split will change. This will be at the forefront of strategic discussions with our Governing Board. Like our inspire unit, we will use research and we will find best practice to ensure our children get the best offer possible within the serious financial constraints that schools operate within. We also work closely within the other schools in the trust who have mixed classes.

This half term has been very busy and a lot has been around celebrating the final term of our Year 6 leavers. I feel very honoured to have known this group of children for 7 years. I still remember Mrs Loach welcoming them through the doors into their reception class. It is been a pleasure to see them develop over the years into the fine young people they are. I am very proud of them and I look forward to hearing about their successes in the future.

As I have mentioned previously we will saying farewell to Miss Cunningham this summer. I would like to thank her for all of the hard work she has put into not only into her class but into leading RE in school as well. She leaves us having delivered our best ever phonics results in the history of the school. Our new Teacher, Miss Bernard, joined us for 2 days this term and has met her new class. She has also had a really good hand over with the reception teachers and has spent a lot of time planning the Year 1 curriculum with Miss Kilvington, ensuring that the year 1 specific curriculum is delivered in both classes.

We will also be welcoming Jana Hodson who will be joining us working as a teaching assistant in the Inspire Unit. She joins us from Poppleton Ousebank Primary.

This is an epic newsletter. Thank you very much to Mrs Cook for allowing me to take some of the words and pictures from the website (www.tockwith.ebor.academy) I wish you all a lovely summer holiday and I look forward to seeing you in September.

In schools, there are many different ways we have to report to the government about children's progress. The following shows a brief outline of each assessment:

Reception Baseline Assessment — Done within first 6 weeks of school.

Good level of development — a summative assessment judgement which is made at the end of reception. 2022 National Average - 65%

Phonics Screening Test — 40 words that the children have to decode. 32 is pass mark. National Average 2022 — 75%

Key Stage 1 SATs — Reading and Maths tests that inform teacher assessment. Writing is solely done from teacher assessment.
