





Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been lovely to see so many of you in school at the end of another successful term at Tockwith. This newsletter always highlights the fantastic opportunities the children have to 'live life in all its fullness' (John 10:10). What it does not do is share the amazingness that happens each and every day. I have a real privilege in being able to walk around the school, in and out of classrooms to see the high quality teaching and learning that is happening.

We recently have had a lot of visitors into the school including the Regional Director of the Department of Education who have been really impressed with the warmth of the school and the positive relationships that exist within. I feel our ethos is very strong here and something we are all very proud of and as we grow it is important that this remains at the heart of Tockwith.

You may be aware, our Pupil admission number in Reception has moved from 30 to 40 to accommodate the growth of the village. The governors, Ebor, NYCC and the school have been discussing this regularly for the last few years. We are aware that the growth will mean that we cannot remain a one form entry school nor do we have the budget or numbers to have 2 classes per year. This will mean that we will be moving, as and when need arises, to mixed classes in Key stage 1 initially. Like anything at Tockwith, we look at best practice in and out of Ebor; we delve into research and we will use our expertise. We will keep you informed of developments as we head into the next academic year. Currently, we do not have confirmed numbers for next year so we can only make plans when we have these. Having taught, led and advised in a number of schools of different sizes and mixes of classes. I have had the pleasure of seeing how this can be a really positive development for the school as have the members of our senior leadership team. We are also very lucky to have active governors who support and challenge us through this process.

As I explained last half term, Miss Cunningham will be leaving us in July to embark on new adventures in the world of theatre. This meant that we were able to advertise early and seek a fantastic teacher to join our team. Our interview process was rigorous and robust and involved governors, school council, house leaders, teachers and teaching assistants. The school council had some wonderful questions including, pick an adjective to describe yourself! As always their thoughts aligned with ours.

After a full day, we were able to offer the position to Miss Bernard who shone during the whole process and was someone we all felt would fit into Team Tockwith really well. Miss Bernard has taught for 2 years in Seaham and has many strengths particularly in the arts.

In the ten years I have been at Tockwith, I have seen a lot of change in the school and as the CEO of Ebor remarked - even though there has been change in the school the high standards continue to improve! This all comes back to an incredibly strong ethos at our school and brilliant working relationships with all.

Year 6 trip to London and the Houses Of Parliament






Extreme read

Shrove Tuesday – this is the traditional feast day before the start of Lent on Ash Wednesday Ash Wednesday – discussing various occasions where formal clothes are worn, putting them in a sack and putting ash on faces and in hair

Lentening - relates to the days getting longer as well as personal growth

The Journey - Jesus' journey across the desert and God speaking to him The Cross & Sharing - discussed that hot cross buns were given to the local poor on Good Friday to mark the end of Lent
