





Dear Parents and Carers,

What a fantastic start of the year we have had. As always the children have settled back into school life so quickly and as you can see from this newsletter, there have been a lot of events going on and children being able to live life in all it's fullness.

This year, we welcomed 35 exceptionally confident children and their families into our school. I was so impressed with how well they came into class but also how well they have settled. I was so impressed with them when they visited the church for their buddy service; their behaviour was absolutely impeccable. Thank you so much to Reverend Martin and Mrs Flood for organising this lovely event.

This term we welcomed Miss Bernard and Mrs Hodson and it has been fantastic to see them settle in so well to school life. We have also appointed Hannah Butterill who will be working with our Year 5 and 6 children.

We started this year with 8 classes and we now have 226 children in school. I was remarking in the Harvest Festival how this has increased by over 50 since I have been here. The increased population of Tockwith and the surrounding areas has meant that we have had to be and will have to be flexible with our class structure in school. I have been delighted how well our Key Stage 1 team and children have adapted to this to make sure that the children in the phase have the opportunity to reach their individual potential. There are many advantages to mixed classes and the senior leadership team, governors and Ebor will continue to monitor and evaluate the educational provision the children are offered in our amazing setting.

Our school development plan this year focuses on this as one of it's key areas.

Strategic Priority 1: For all children to reach their individual potential and to prepare them for the future.

To build on high outcomes for the children across the school enabled from staff Monitoring and Evaluation of new INSPIRE unit

Strategic Priority Two: Ensure pupils develop a depth of understanding in all subjects

A knowledge rich curriculum that is rooted in the bible and ensures that the children can live life in all it's fullness.

We do more, know more and remember more, ensuring our children develop a depth of understanding across the curriculum and we are able to measure impact.

Strategic Priority Three: For all to live life in all it's fullness - John 10:10

Ensure that all children have enrichment opportunities offered to them. Everyone in the school has an improved understanding of equality, diversity and inclusion especially considering monocultural area we live in

This term, our data from the last year was officially released.

The most important aspect of this latest release is the progress measure which calculates the progress made between the end of Key stage 1 and 2.

This is measured between -5 and 5.

A score of 0 means pupils in this school on average do about as well at K52 as those with similar prior attainment nationally.

• A positive score means pupils in this school on average do better at KS2 as those with similar prior attainment nationally.

Our score was:

Reading 0.8 Writing 1.74 Maths 1.72.

This means we have secured positive progress, yet again, for our children whilst maintaining our high levels of attainment which is significantly above national average.

Humphrey Head



Harvest Festival


