The school has recently invested in an online reading programme called 'Reading Plus.'
Children from Year 2 to Year 6 have been given their own personalised learning account which enables them to select from a variety of online texts from a range of genres including: Personal Journey, Our Earth, Heroes and Trailblazers, Mystery and Adventure, Art and Culture, How Things Work, Time Machine and Get in the Game. The programme provides automatically customised lesson features which build and develop children's reading fluency and comprehension and vocabulary.

Reading Plus can be used at both home and at school to develop and enhance reading skills and staff have already seen improvements in children's motivation and reading skills.

At school, we have started Reading Plus. Reading Plus is an online website on which you can explore different genres and styles of reading. Reading Plus works on levels and when you start reading more text faster, you will move up a level.

Reading plus makes reading more enjoyable at school, with a wide variety of books. It will tell you if you are reading too fast and will quiz you on the text at the end to see if you have really understood what you have read, then it will give you a score based on how many questions you answered correctly. It will show you on your dashboard how many words you have read and lots of additional information about your personal reading.

At the start of your Reading Plus journey, you will answer a questionnaire which decides what level you begin on.

I am really enjoying using this website; my favourite text so far is We All Scream for Ice Cream! Martha, Year 6

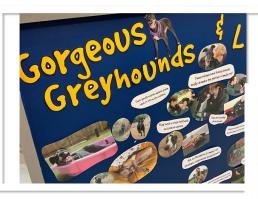






















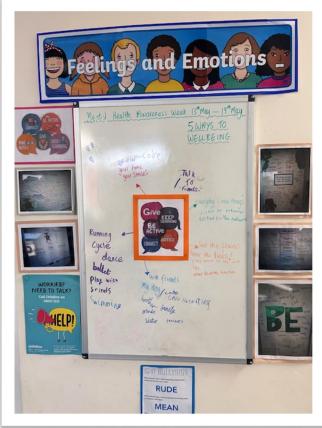
Pastoral Note

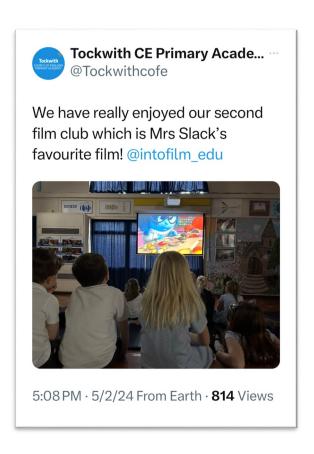
