





Dear Parents and Carers,

What a fantastic start of the year we have had. It has been fantastic to see children settle into their new classes so well. It has been lovely to walk around the school and see children 'living life in all it's fullness'

This term, we have welcomed 25 new children into our setting to start their journey through our school. It has been lovely to welcome new families in this year group and to meet them at various transition events and school events through the term, especially the buddy service with their new year 6 buddies. Thank you to Reverend Martin, Karen Flood and Mrs Perry for giving the opportunity to the children and families to be welcomed into the church. From first impressions this is a super cohort of children who exhibit amazing learning behaviours and have a true love for life.

We have also welcomed Miss Taylor, Mrs Schippers and Mrs Gould into our school and it already feels like they have been here for ages as they have settled in so well. We have also said 'see you soon' to Mrs Medley who is due to have a baby very soon. We will welcome Miss Cunningham back while Mrs Medley enjoys being a mummy, It has been fantastic to see the team work together to ensure the children still receive an excellent education during the transition to Miss Cunningham. Also, a thank you to the parents and carers for your understanding.

We now currently have 233 children in our setting and 8 classes within the school. This is likely to change as we move forward and has meant the introduction of mixed age classes in Key Stage 1. These will move into lower key stage 2 as the larger year groups move through the school. We are working closely with the local authority who are in charge of our admissions whilst strategically planning for the future with our governors and Ebor Trust.

Last year, we released our performance data for last year. I shared how pleased I was with the attainment of the children. We have just been shared how this compares nationally with other schools

For those of you who like statistics you will appreciate this. Simply translated this means that the school performed 98% better than other schools in achieving their Reading, writing and Maths expected levels in all 3 subjects or we could say we are in the top 2% of schools. Wow! However, this is just a snapshot of children's education and does not tell you what an amazing bunch of children they were. What makes me feel super proud was talking to the head teachers at King James and Tadcaster about how our children from last year are flourishing in their new settings this year. We talk about 'preparing for the future' in our aims statement and hearing positive things really reinforces the fact that we are doing this well.

Speaking of preparing for the future, we know that the vast majority of our children have to get the bus to their secondary school so time keeping is essential otherwise the bus goes with out them. We are noticing an increase in the number of lates coming into school recently. Just a reminder that school starts at 8.50am.

I wish you all a lovely autumnal half term holiday and I look forward to seeing you in November.

Our new governor




Friendship Day

- The Farmer and the Clown


The children were amazing, helping and supporting each other, it was so lovely to see them working together and live out one of our core values.
