What if my child is ill?

- Please note If you child is suffering from sickness or diarrhoea they cannot not return until after a full 24 hours from the cessation of symptoms.
- If your child has an appointment please inform the class teacher. You can then pick your child up from the office.

Guidance for Head Lice

- We would ask parents to be on the look out for head lice in their children's hair.
- The best way to search is 'wet combing' which involves washing and conditioning your child's hair before using a head lice comb, and combing thoroughly whist still wet.
- We recommend that long hair is tied up for school.



The Governing Body









What are you reading Mrs Cook?

I adore reading and read purely to relax and for enjoyment. I love getting fully submerged in a book to the extent that I can spend all night trying to finish a book to find out what happens!







I also love the Jack Reacher books by Lee Child. Some of the books have also been made into TV series, which are very good.




What are you reading Mrs Perry?


I love reading. I tend to do most of my reading on holidays, at the weekend and in the evenings.



My favourite 'desert island' book would be To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee.








What are you reading Mrs Williamson?

help me achieve personal growth.






What are you reading Mrs Schippers?

Curled up on the sofa with a hot cup of tea, my cat sat on my knee and a good book to read is my perfect way to spend an evening.

I absolutely love escaping into books and particularly like to read stories about characters who I feel a connection to and really care about; this was the case with my most recent book, 'Metronome'. I was desperate to find out what happened to Aina and Whitney on the island they had been exiled to but, at the same time, I really didn't want the story to end because it was just so beautifully - almost poetically - written. The plot was such an unusual idea, the description of the island meant that I really could imagine every detail of the place, the characters were believable, the choices that they had to face were heart breaking and I was thoroughly engrossed in it from start to finish.

I also enjoy reading children's books and 'Pax' has to be my absolute favourite. I read this book before reading it to my old Year 5/6 class and ended up in tears more than once as it's such a powerful, moving story. It's about the bond between a boy and his pet fox, set against a backdrop of the destruction of war and the devastation it leaves in its wake. I was so taken by the story that I ended up writing a whole series of lessons based on it just so we could enjoy the book over a longer period of time as a class. It's about friendship, truth, kindness, loyalty and choosing what sort of a person you want to be, regardless of your start in life. Just like in 'Metronome', I was really invested in the characters and appreciative of the atmospheric writing.





What are you reading Miss Davidson?

In my spare time, I love getting lost in a good book! I especially enjoy stories based on real events from the past. These books help me imagine what life was like long ago and remind me how much the world has changed. They also make me feel grateful for the way we live today.

Reading about history is like stepping into a time machine and it allows me to learn from the past and appreciate what we have now. The stories are often powerful and moving.

One of the books that made an impact on me was Fire Over Heathrow by Susan Ottaway. It's a true story about the bravery of a flight attendant, and what makes it even more special is that she went to the same primary school in Scarborough as I did!
