As I have mentioned before, at the end of this term Hannah Spurr will be moving to her promoted position of Operational Business Partner and Sue Cook will now become the Senior Administrator. When you return, a new face will be greeting you at the office. We would like to welcome Kayley Spence, who will be joining us and will be your first port of call when you come into the school reception area.

As you are aware the school is growing in numbers. The numbers joining us in September in reception have not been confirmed yet so we cannot make any concrete plans for Key Stage 1 yet. In addition to this budgets are still being finalised. Sadly, in all schools budgets are tight as 'efficiencies' are being encouraged by the government. We are not able to confirm staffing until next half term.

That said, we are able to confirm that next year that we will be moving to 3 classes in Year 3 and 4 due to the high numbers in Year 2 and 3. These will all be mixed year 3/4 classes and the classes will be picked based on teaching observation and knowledge, children's voice, social emotional, behaviour and learning needs. We are currently shortlisting for this position and we will be appointing at the start of next term. There will be a transition week in early July so they will get to know their new class.






University of York St John

Breathing Techniques for Calm & Focus

☐ Balloon Breath (Deep Belly Breathing)

- · Sit comfortably and place both hands on the belly.
- Inhale deeply through the nose, feeling the belly expand like a balloon.
- · Slowly exhale through the mouth, imagining the balloon deflating.
- Repeat 5–10 times to bring a sense of calm.

□When to use it? Before bed, in the morning, or even on the way to school!

Five-Finger Breathing (For Instant Calm)

- Hold out one hand, fingers spread.
- Use the other hand to trace up each finger while breathing in.
- · Trace down each finger while breathing out.
- Keep going until all fingers have been traced.

□When to use it? Before an exam, when feeling overwhelmed, or any time nerves kick in

☐ Bumblebee Breath (To Quiet a Busy Mind)

- Inhale deeply through the nose.
- As you exhale, make a soft humming sound like a bumblebee.
- · Close your eyes and focus on the gentle vibration.
- Repeat 3–5 times.
- □ When to use it? Before bedtime or any time your child needs to feel grounded.
