





Dear Parents and Carers,

The summer seems like a long time ago now that the leaves are falling and the darker nights are closing in.

This year, we have welcomed 33 new starters and it has been delightful to see them settle into Tockwith life so well. I have been amazed by how well they have coped with their Welcome to Reception service at the church with their year 6 buddies and their learning routines in school. A visiting headteacher visited the class and commented on how immersed the children were in their learning.

I have the privilege of having seen our current year 6 join us many years ago and it was an absolute pleasure to see them thrive while they spent a week away from home in Humphrey Head on their residential trip. Over 6 years of living life in all its fullness has served them very well. I was so proud of them as a group of children.

We have also had new starters with Mrs Darley, Miss Berry and Miss Penfold joining our team and it has been fantastic to see how well they have settled in. Next half term Miss Taylor will be leaving us to have her baby. We have aimed for the 13th November but I am sure you will understand the challenges of setting a date at this time and you will join me in wishing Miss Taylor all the best. We have appointed Mr Mike Finan, who is an experienced teacher having taught in Leeds and abroad more recently. He will be starting with us on the 17th November.

This term we had a school review from Ebor Academy Trust. This is incredibly useful for us and we used it to have a deep look into our new classroom structures and assess the impact on the curriculum. For the review, the Director of Education, an executive headteacher, the head of SEND and the head of safeguarding immersed themselves into school life. The team spent the day in lessons, they also spoke to the children and to the staff. Our children and staff shone and I was particularly proud with the school's ethos being described as 'clear, established and profound'.

Our school development plan this half term is focussed on 3 strategic priorities:

- 1) To ensure consistency in high quality wave 1 teaching which leads to continued high outcomes for all children in all phases.
- 2) Developing resilience
- 3) For all children to reach their individual potential across the curriculum

These targets are very closely aligned with our vision for the school, for all children to reach their individual potential and, through our Christian values, prepare them for the future.

One other target I would be really keen to push next half term is the number of lates over the last few weeks. School starts at 8.50 and it is really important that your children are at school on time. We always talk about preparing our children for the future and being on time will make their and your lives much easier as the grow up into adulthood.

Having watched the children play, and asked for their voices via our school council, we are focussing on expanding the construction resources and creating an enormous sandpit. This is a big investment and really exciting for the children. We will keep updating you and asking you for things we could put to use!


Humphrey head Visit - Year 6

Confirmation

Stump Cross Caverns 3/4

This week, year 3/4 enjoyed our exciting adventure to Stump Cross Caverns. We spent the day exploring the caves, where we learned about stalactites and stalagmites. We were amazed by how old these rock formations were! During our visit, we also learned about an incredible discovery made at the Caverns: the teeth of a wolverine, an extinct creature that once lived in Britain thousands of years ago. It was amazing to imagine such a powerful animal roaming the countryside long before humans were here. The guides told us how the wolverine's remains were found deep inside the caves, preserved in the rock and mud. Learning about this ancient animal helped us understand how fossils and bones can reveal what life was like in the past. It made our trip feel like a real journey through time.

After our cave tour, we made our own fossil imprints to take home- a perfect souvenir of our visit! It was such a fun and unforgettable trip that really brought our science lessons to life.
